🧡 Protect More Land

Increase the pace of land protection that responds to community needs

- Help protect at least ten more farms, forests, waters, and community spaces in the Stowe region.
- Pinpoint where, when, and how land conservation can help meet community-identified needs for workforce and affordable housing, more public greenspaces, and better access to parks, natural areas, and trails.
- Protect land and support related strategies important to adapting to a changing climate.
- Enhance support for local families and landowners who want to conserve the region's special places.
- Support local planning to ensure conservation and community needs are heard and advanced.

Care for Conserved & Public Lands

Invest in our commitment to steward special places

- Identify and work to address the most pressing issues facing our conserved and public lands from recreational overuse to invasive species to climate impacts.
- Grow and support a diverse group of volunteers to help care for conserved lands, public recreation areas, and trails.
- Strengthen community partnerships to maintain an ecologically healthy and welcoming network of public lands, waters, and trails.
- Invest in technology to help better understand and more easily respond to land and water stewardship needs.

Deepen our Work on Land-Related Community Issues

Advance a shared vision for a sustainable future

- Advocate for a compact settlement pattern that supports people, wildlife, and the economy.
- Define how the land trust will support the development of local affordable and workforce housing.
- Foster new relationships with organizations representing marginalized groups to better support their work and expand access to the benefits of conservation for more people.

Provide critical experiences and connections

- Partner with local schools and community organizations to develop programs and projects to get more kids and families outdoors on an ongoing basis.
- Host events and programs that build community, create joyful connections and memorable experiences, and include more people who have been left out of conservation.
- Expand our efforts to make key community conservation areas more welcoming, accessible, and engaging to everyone connected to the Stowe area.

Invest in Trails

Increase the accessibility, connectivity, and sustainability of our trail network

- Collaborate with partners to create a community-wide Master Trail and Recreation Plan to support a community that is more walkable, bikeable, and accessible.
- Help establish new trails, especially key connectors between neighborhoods, schools, existing trail pods, and other community spaces.
- Support critical investments in our most-loved and most-used trails to ensure their long-term health and sustainability.

Build the Foundation to Create Needed Change

Increase our ability to act quickly, innovatively, and strategically

- Expand our communication strategy to be more diverse, integrated, and welcoming to grow support across programs and initiatives. Share more stories of change that are designed to inspire and connect with all people.
- Increase the pace of conservation by expanding opportunities for people and businesses to contribute financially, including growing participation in our planned and corporate giving programs, gifts of land, and ongoing annual support.
- Undertake a comprehensive capital campaign of at least \$5 million to support immediate and long-term conservation needs. Accelerate our fundraising to achieve strategic goals.
- Grow and invest in our staff to ensure we can seize opportunities, build lasting relationships, enhance volunteer capacity, and expand our impact.
- Establish a permanent headquarters that will serve as a hub for community and conservation connections.
